I would like to start by saying a huge thank you for your support this year. I think it is fair to say that this year has been challenging with the work programmes and day to day working. However as a paediatric team you have continued to support the PCC and SIC ODN's to continue to achieve our aims.

There is a huge focus on elective recovery and working together with the elective recovery team it feels that we may be making some headway with raising the profile of paediatric surgery. We have successfully produced the, tonsillectomy best practice, the testicular torsion and foreign body guidelines which could not have happened without your support. We have also started our service review visits which at last sees the ODN team coming out to meet with the surgical teams around the region, something which we are looking forward to and hope that you find these visits useful.

The PACU course has been really well received and has been noted nationally as evidence of excellent practice lead by the ODN, this is something we are very proud of. Well, this is a busy time of year for everyone isn't it?!

We have been busy here at the ODN wrapping up the final HDU Level 1 course with our candidates from across the region from our Autumn cohort. It has been great to get out and meet lots of wonderful nurses across the region for skills days and OSCEs and see first-hand the hard work and dedication that goes into looking after sick children across the region, particularly at this seasonally busy time of year. It is also lovely to see many staff confidently looking after children requiring Level 1 and 2 HDU care across the region by trained, excellent staff, meaning that those children can be looked after closer to home. This makes such an impact on both the children and their families.

We tried something new this autumn by running some Nurses Skills 'n' drills simulation days in conjunction with PANDR, the regional retrieval team. These were very well attended and we spent the day facilitating participants to take part in some stabilisation simulations in small groups followed by debrief, teaching and skills stations. We covered respiratory, seizure, cardiac (prostin) and peripheral inotropes scenarios, all of which seemed well received and we had a fun and productive day of learning. We hope to repeat these in 2024 so please do look out for the booking form and dates when they become available



We have definitely seen an improvement in the discharge process with so many more DGH's being in a better position to take the CYP as a step down from the tertiary centre and when they are coming in acutely unwell. Thanks to your staff who have attended the study day and completed the pre and post course questionnaire, I have been able to capture the improvement in confidence and knowledge.

You should all be aware by now, that there is a paediatric long term ventilation guideline for you all to use when looking after a CYP on LTV either non-invasively or by a tracheostomy. The LTV and Tracheostomy competency booklets are also out and available on the website for you to use within your trust. There is a guidance with both of these to help the assessor sign staff off, if you need any support with this please contact me or one of the ODN PCC education team.

I am also in the late stages of developing a paediatric LTV and Tracheostomy E-learning package for you all to use. We will let you know when this is available and how best to use for your trust.

There is still a lot of work that needs to be continued in the development of pathways and documentation of LTV patients to make the CYP's journey from hospital to home so much better. As you are probably all aware I am leaving this role, my last day will be the 7th January. The job is currently out for advert along with the clinical lead for LTV, once in post I am sure the service will continue to develop with your help to support families with a child on LTV.

I would just like to say, thank you so much to everyone I have worked with both in the ODN team and the DGH's across the East of England. I have learnt a lot and I hope I have helped you all in some way. I am sure I will see many of you as paths always seem to cross within paediatrics.

Dear all,

Thank you for your hard work and support to the network. We all work hard in individual patches to improve the surgical care for children but most of the time the work remains unnoticed.

In our recently started unit visits, it was evident that despite all the obstacles and complexities of the system, individual professionals are still very enthusiastic and passionate about the service they provide. Our national meetings are taking shape and we had our first face to face meeting last month. Our maturation journey is quite comparable to many other ODNs. Our regional team was visited by National GIRFT team to discuss our performance. Lot of hard work from Damian Griffiths and Eniko went in Preparing our data sets and information. Our performance is satisfactory and above the bar in certain areas.

Over the last year we have three regional and one national guidelines in place and few more in pipeline. The trauma and orthopaedics regional meeting organised by Anish Sanghrajka took place in November which is first of our face-to-face speciality meeting. Pranav Kukreja and Jessica Bewick have delivered the airway course which was well received. Jessica is working hard to support the trusts to try and bring the ENT waiting lists down which is a key issue for us as the region ( also an on in other regional and nationally). Damian has done an excellent job of delivering the current clinical pathways which we intend to check during or visits. Eniko has done an excellent job in developing the dashboard with regional team. Francesca has been instrumental in getting the guidelines over the finish line and continues to provide the educational support to the nursing teams.

Looking back at the year a lot has been achieved but there still remains a lot. Over first half of next year we will be focusing on the unit visits and look forward to meeting many of you in your own environment. We also intend to review the neonatal surgical work and pathways.

### JESSICA BEWICK-ENT LEAD CLINICIAN

We continue to be busy in paediatric ENT with several active projects. The third EPAR course was held in November with a great faculty and enjoyable day for all delegates. A repeat course is planned for 2023, date to be confirmed. A working group of ENT surgeons and audiologists met this autumn with the aim of developing a regional guideline to streamline the investigation of childhood hearing loss. There is much variation in practice across the region and the priority is to expand genetic testing where appropriate for all children in the East of England. It is currently limited to children falling under specific centres whose staff are trained in genetic consenting. Please do get in touch if you would like to be involved in this work.

The big focus within the ENT network is on tackling the ever growing elective outpatient and inpatient waiting lists. There has been a great deal of interest from the CYP elective recover group to develop novel solutions to this issue. We have run a Task and finish group to identify solutions and incentives for elective recovery work. The findings of this will be presented to ICB CYP leads in early 2024. With the elective admitted waiting list at close to 4000 children we need a regional effort to improve surgical capacity in 2024.
